

The height of luxury

Set to the backdrop of a World Heritagelisted national park, Spicers Peak Lodge takes luxury accommodation to new heights - not least of all because you'll find this property 1100 metres (3,600 feet) above sea level in the naturally beautiful Southern Queensland Country region.

Everything about this escape is designed to cocoon the soul, with an all-inclusive tariff, which covers award-winning cuisine, non-alcoholic and alcoholic beverages (excluding premium cocktails and Cellar Master wines), and a raft of outdoor activities like yoga, guided mountain biking and hiking.

Wearing the title of Australia's highest nonalpine lodge retreat, expect to find a main lodge built from Scottish blue stone and recycled timber, surrounded by ten luxurious suites and two private lodges.

At your doorstep is 8000-acres of private property to explore, a refuge for rare and threatened flora that you'll find nowhere else in the world.

As memorable as the architecture and landscape Spicers Peak Lodge is set within, the onsite restaurant, The Peak, is just as remarkable, earning two chef hats in the Australian Good Food Guide.

Lay in the lap of luxury

Escape the everyday and settle into the luxurious embrace of Spicers Peak Lodge.

Choose between five luxury lodge suites, three luxury spa suits, two loft suites and two private lodges at this wilderness escape.

Each suite features king sized beds with luxurious linens, private bathrooms with stone-floor shower, complimentary mini bar and individual room touches from fireplaces to outdoor spas.



Befitting of a luxury stay, each suite enjoys scenic views, whether it be mountain views or rural farmland views.

Scenic Rim Trail

Walk on the wild side and join the Spicers Scenic Rim Trail.

These all-inclusive, luxury walks range from two to six days, following the ridge lines of Main Range National Park.

Depending on the format you choose you'll cover between 12:18km (7:11 miles) a day through World Heritage-listed Gondwana Rainforest that's been growing for 550-million years.

The six-day hike is their premier trail, packaging breath taking scenery, diverse walking terrain across 80km (49 miles) of hiking, all fuelled by award-winning food and wine.

In the six-day format, enjoy five nights at Spicers eco-camps and two nights at Spicers Peak Lodge, along with a scenic helicopter transfer on your final morning.



You'll be required to bring your essentials - the Spicers team will supply packed morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea, sunscreen, insect spray, and first aid kits.

Gourmet Dining

From sustainably sourced seafood to premium heritage poultry, diners can expect the best of Australian produce delivered across an expansive menu.

The onsite sommeliers take as much pride as the chef in carefully matching the grape to your course, with most beverages (save for cellar reserve wine) all included in your room rate. In recognition of its culinary feats, The Peak has two Chef-Hats in the Australian Good Food Guide from 2019 through to 2022.

The Peak opens its doors to non-guests too for service, making it ideal for a destination-lunch date. Out exploring the beautiful Scenic Rim? Ask The Peak to prepare you a gourmet picnic for your travels.



The Peak serves breakfast, lunch and dinner with a five-course degustation and a la carte menu offered seven days a week.

Rest & Rewind

Turn the relaxation dial up a notch at Spa Anise, the onsite spa at Spicers Peak Lodge.

When you're not inside one of the single or double spa rooms, enjoy the facilities which include a plunge spa pool on the deck and relaxation lounge, complete with open stone fireplace. Their cornerstone treatment, Peak Signature, combines full body massage, foot treatment and scalp ritual across one and a half hours of pure treatment bliss.

Getting here



Allow two hours to drive from Brisbane to Spicers Peak Lodge taking the Cunningham Highway. The route will take you past Ipswich, Kalbar, Aratula before climbing the Great Dividing Range towards Maryvale. Parking is available on site.



Three airports service Spicers Peak Lodge - Brisbane Airport (140km/87 miles), Wellcamp Airport Toowoomba (125km/78 miles) and Gold Coast Airport (182km/113 miles), each with car rental or limousine transfers to the property.



Private helicopter transfers can be arranged to the property.

Location

Spicers Peak Lodge is a two-hour drive south-west of Brisbane in the township of Maryvale, overlooking Main Range National Park and the Great Dividing Range.

If arriving by car, bear in mind the driveway to access the property alone can take 20-25 minutes to traverse and is not suitable for low sports cars.



Meet the locals

While there might be space for only 26 guests at Spicers Peak Lodge, you can expect to meet more friendly locals when you're exploring the grounds. Native flora and fauna are in abundance here, with common sightings of kangaroo (common wallaroo and eastern grey kangaroo), three species of wallaby (endangered brush-tailed rock wallaby, the whiptail wallaby and rednecked wallaby), koalas, parrots, and owls.

Need to know

What should you bring?

Sitting high on the Great Dividing Range, guests should expect Spicers Peak Lodge to be eight to ten degrees colder than Brisbane throughout the year. As such, a light jacket is essential packing all year round. For the rest of the time, smart casual attire, unless you're out hiking, is the dress code for this luxury lodge

Wi Fi

While Spicers Peak Lodge has Wi-Fi throughout, the region enjoys minimal phone reception, especially if you're taking the Scenic Rim Trail. Tell your friends, family, and colleagues you're going offline and enjoy a moment of solitude.

Children welcome

Families are welcome to stay in the twobedroom private lodge, however, beyond accommodating children, there are no other specific child-friendly activities here such as highchairs, children's menus, or kids' programs.

When to visit

Seasonality plays an important role in the Spicers Peak Lodge experience, with the destination unlike other parts of the State truly experiencing four seasons. In winter, guests can expect to warm up by the hearth of a crackling fireplace, or in summer, marvel in the long afternoon glow of sunset with an afternoon walk.
